1. All f owers must be in place by 11 a.m. on Thursday. Pre-registration required.
2. All plants and $f$ owers must be grown by exhibitor for at least six weeks prior to showing. Plants should be LABELED. 3. "Best Display" refers frst to Quality, second to Quantity.
3. Commercial exhibits will not be allowed to compete for premiums.
4. All exhibits will be judged on quality and judge may withhold award if entries are not worthy.
5. No single entry may be exhibited under more than one class.
6. Containers to be furnished by exhibitor 8. Judge's decision is f nal.
7. *Read your schedule well. Take care to enter exhibits in the proper class. A specimen will be disqualif ed if it has more or less stems, sprays, stalks, blooms, etc. than the spike or stalk in its natural growing form, unless indicated on the schedule. A bud showing color is classif ed as a f ower.
*Specimens should be clean, free of insect damage and with an attractive amount of foliage left attached. Remove all foliage above the waterline tag. Visitors all like to know the names of f owers exhibited. 10. Any type of basket or vase may be used for arrangements. 11. All exhibits must remain on display until 6 p.m. on Sunday.
